REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES For The Year Ended 31 March 2022

The financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustees Investments (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

As stated in the company's governing document, the company's objects are to advance the arts locally, nationally and internationally through production of live performance, arts projects, events and opportunities for the benefit of the public in partnership with artists, arts organisations, venues and funders.

Independent Arts Projects Ltd. (IAP) incorporated in 2017, began trading in April 2018 and became a registered charity in May 2019.

Based in Leith, IAP works with some of Scotland's most talented and innovative artists and theatre makers to develop, produce and tour a programme of productions, arts projects, artistic development events and opportunities for communities in Scotland and beyond.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The programme for 2021-22 included projects that reached young people, families, schools, and adults across Scotland, London and Egypt.

In 2021-22 the programme included 63 socially-distanced performances of 3 different productions in 20 locations across Scotland, London and Egypt, that reached 2,710 people. These included two brand new works by Scotland based artists and a socially distanced tour to schools, community spaces and arts centres.

In addition, the programme included two new participative arts projects engaging 131 children, young people, and neurodivergent people across Scotland.

Two new projects were given research and development time.

At a time when many of the Freelancers who make up the theatre and participative arts workforce were out of work, Independent Arts Projects created 77 paid opportunities for workers - length of contracts ranged from half a day to 21-months.

Initially written as a stage play in reaction to the 2012-14 mob assaults in Tahrir Square, Niqabi Ninja by Sara Shaarawi was presented as an audio play that audience members experience while walking along city streets at night. On their way, they hear the narrative unfold while encountering illustrations of the story's heroine inspired by the graphic-novel style revenge fantasy.

The production was presented at ArtsAdmin in East London as part of Shubbak Arab Arts Festival, simultaneously in five cities across Scotland (Aberdeen's Music Hall, Dundee Rep Theatre, Inverness' Eden Court Theatre, Glasgow's Tramway and Lyceum Theatre as part of Edinburgh International Festival), Niqabi Ninja was also presented by our partners Hewar Company at Jesuit Cultural Center in Alexandria and Goethe Institute in Cairo

Mamoru Iriguchi was engaged as lead artist to create this new production for everyone aged 12 and over that celebrates diverse gender identities and sexualities. S.E.X. positively emphasises the importance of pleasure in sexual activities, noting that most of our sexual activities are not intended for reproductive results. It is also models enthusiastic consent throughout the show.

S.E.X. was winner of the Infallibles Award 2021 in the category of Best Show for Young Audiences and nominated for a Creative Edinburgh Award in the Creativity Category and a Critics Awards for Theatre in Scotland in the category of Best Production for Children and Young People.

The production received overwhelmingly positive responses from audiences, industry and press and was featured on BBC Loop.

Originally planned for touring in March 2020, this rescheduled tour included 12 performances of Waves in 7 locations across Scotland in a mixture of small-scale theatres, arts, community, and school spaces in October 2021. Beacon Arts Centre in Greenock, Inverclyde, supported the production by providing rehearsal and technical time an d space.

Audience groups included 2 primary schools, groups of older people, women's groups and wider intergenerational public audiences. Audience capacities were limited to ensure Covid safety and that audience members could feel confident returning to theatre.

Creative Engagement Programmes

NEA Youth Arts Residencies 2021-22

Working with North Edinburgh Arts, IAP supported delivery of a new Youth Arts Grants scheme to support 5 youth arts practitioners to engage children and young people in new arts projects in Muirhouse, North Edinburgh. This project was funded by Creative Scotland through the Youth Arts Fund Small Grants Scheme.

Each artist was awarded a grant of £5,000 to design and deliver their own youth arts projects in Muirhouse. The programme ensures accessible creative opportunities continue to exist for children and young people in North Edinbugrh despite the pandemic.

Sensory Collective

Sensory Collective is a Culture Collective project funded by Scottish Government through Creative Scotland to support Creative Practitioners to work with communities.

Sensory Collective supports six artists and one producer to work independently and collectively to co-create sensory arts experiences with and for groups of people who experience multiple barriers to access creative experiences: Autists, people with Profound and Multiple Learning Disabilities and people living with Dementia.

Recruitment for the Sensory Collective team took place in autumn 2021 and staff were recruited and in post by December. The team includes people who identify as neurodivergent and disabled, artists based in Edinburgh, Fife, Glasgow, and Highland areas and artists whose sensory arts practice is rooted in visual arts, music, and performance.

The project was initially funded for one year and has been extended by nine months. Projects include work in homes, gardens, woods, beaches, day centres, schools, and online. Each project is artist led and offers scope for training and sharing practice with peers inside and out of the collective.

Writing and rehearsal time was carried out to research and develop this new work by Ian Cameron & Sean Hay in June 2021, with the aim of developing ideas and a working script for future production. The team came together to work in summertime so they could use a well ventilated space and maintained social distancing and covid-safety protocols throughout the process. THE BUSH by Alice Mary Cooper

The Bush is to be a new storytelling theatre production that tells the story of the world's first green ban - when, in 1971 thirteen Sydney housewives joined forces with workers from the Builders Laborers Federation to fight local council and property developers in order to save Kelly's Bush - now heritage listed bushland.

Research, writing and development time took place throughout 2021. Alice worked remotely with Australian based Dramaturg Frederick Cooperwaite and in studio with Director Caitlin Skinner and Sound Designer Niroshini Thambar to develop the story and production. Development supported by Creative Scotland.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

Income for the year was in the form of grants and earned income from presentations in UK and overseas.

The charity reserves are £188,505 of which £180,289 will be spent of projects within a year. The company will be working towards securing reserves to cover three months of operating costs.

The Charity is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity. It is governed by the terms of its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The Charity can appoint up to 10 Trustees at any one time. In accordance with the Articles of Association all Trustees shall retire from office every year and are eligible for re-election.

Trustees are recruited for their understanding and support of the work of the company and the specialist skills and knowledge. The current trustees have skills in the areas of running a charitable company, arts management, financial management, production management and fundraising.

Trustees review the composition of the board in relation to skill, ability and background and consider potential new candidates for appointment at trustee meetings. New trustees may be elected by the board to membership and then appointed to the board or recruited by open application.

Staff are appointed by the Trustees to manage the day-to-day operations of the organisation. The staff have authority to delegate duties as required to other staff members and contractors to ensure the smooth running of the company.

Independent Arts Projects engages Mhari Robinson as Executive Producer and employs Nina Doherty as Sensory Producer. Kirstin Abraham, Dr Sonia Allori, Kirsty Nicolson, and Joanna Young are employed and Max Alexander and Niroshini Thambar are engaged as Sensory Artists.

The company is committed to ensuring it has all the necessary policies and procedures in place to ensure the effective running of the company and to safeguard all employees, contractors, audiences and participants.

Decision making

The Trustees review the principal risks and uncertainties faced by the company at each quarterly board meeting. The major risk of financial uncertainty is mitigated by budgeting and forecasting.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006: The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

- 33% on cost

Computer equipment

- 33% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
