REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES For The Year Ended 31 March 2023

The financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustees Investments (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

As stated in the company's governing document, the company's objects are to advance the arts locally, nationally and internationally through production of live performance, arts projects, events and opportunities for the benefit of the public in partnership with artists, arts organisations, venues and funders.

Independent Arts Projects Ltd. (IAP) incorporated in 2017, began trading in April 2018 and became a registered charity in May 2019.

Based in Leith, IAP works with some of Scotland's most talented and innovative artists and theatre makers to develop, produce and tour a programme of productions, arts projects, artistic development events and opportunities for communities in Scotland and beyond.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The programme for 2022-23 included projects that reached young people, families, schools, and adults across Scotland, and in some cases, England.

In 2022-23 Independent Arts Projects reached 3,791 people across the UK with a programme of 26 participative workshops, 142 1-to-1 sessions and 61 performances in community spaces, theatres, care settings, schools, homes, woods, beaches, and parks.

We continue to present a programme focussed on young people, families, and people with additional support needs. We workwith artists, performers, and other freelance practitioners from underrepresented groups. We employed or engaged 64 people in this year. We work with artists from various disciplines and backgrounds to explore identity, creative access, and sensory experience.

SENSORY COLLECTIVE

An Independent Arts Projects programme made possible by Culture Collective, funded by Scottish Government emergency Covid-19 funds through Creative Scotland.

Sensory Collective supports six artists and one producer to work independently and collectively to co-create sensory arts experiences with and for groups of people who experience multiple barriers to access creative experiences: Autists, people with Complex Needs and people living with Dementia.

Sensory Collective is made up of: Kirstin Georgia Abraham, Dr Sonia Allori, Max Alexander, Nina Doherty, Kirsty Biff Nicolson, Niroshini Thambar and Joanna Young. The team includes people who identify as neurodivergent and disabled, artists based in Edinburgh, Fife, Glasgow, and Highland areas and artists whose sensory arts practice is rooted in visual arts, music, and performance.

The project was initially funded for one year and has been extended to 21-months. Each project is artist led and offers scope for training and sharing practice with peers inside and out of the collective. The team are supported by additional freelance practitioners, providers of access support, artists, support staff, and specialists (fire-making, life-guarding, as well as creative practitioners).

Project work has been delivered in three ways:

- Working 1-to-1 with individuals (supported by carers or family members) in their own homes and gardens, woodlands and forests, beaches, in swimming pools and lakes (and on bouncy castles)
- Working with small groups of pupils in mainstream and ASN schools, Autistic people and people with Complex Needs
- Working in and with Day Centres who work with older people including people with Alzheimer's and Dementia

Projects include:

- Seated movement workshops with live music and singing for elders, including people with Dementia and Alzheimer's in Glasgow. Sessions are inspired by the seaside, memories of water, shells and clay. Participants commented: "It's done my body good", "the music is fantastic", while staff fed back, "it's good for everyone's wellbeing, especially mental health."
- Sensory workshops for families who have a young family member with Autism and complex needs in Fife and Lothian providing inspiration, support and respite through workshops and experiences inspired by the elements of water (wild swimming), wind (using fans & inflatable platforms), and fire (campfire stories). Families have said how important it is to feel welcome and valued in sessions: "It was something we could all do together, and we just felt like a 'normal' family."
- Play Sessions for Autistic individuals and small groups with participants aged 5-40+ in Strathclyde, Lothians, and central Scotland. Sessions have been delivered 1-to-1 or in small groups to inform the development and creation of a tourable play space that celebrates Autistic and Neurodivergent joy. The play space will have its first outings in summer 2023.

SOUND SYMPHONY by Ellie Griffiths [UK Tour & At Home]
A co-production between Oily Cart Theatre and Independent Arts Projects

Supported by Arts Council England, BBC Children in Need, Creative Scotland, Esmée Fairbairn, Garfield Weston, Hugh Fraser Foundation, Radcliffe & Thistledown Trust.

Made for sound seekers, this show is a journey through music, sound and silence. Weaving together cello, singing and object noises, Sound Symphony is designed to create a sensory-rich environment, where the audience can feel the music through their whole body. This highly interactive performance aims to give audiences with complex autism access to high-quality theatre.

Performers: Sonia Allori, Daniel Gouly, George Panda, Greg Sinclair, Shiori Usui. Creative team: Ellie Griffiths, Greg Sinclair, Hannah Venet, Matt Padden, Colin Grenfell. Production team: Dave Bailey, Katy Steele, Gary Staerk. Producers: Alison Garratt & Zoe Lally.

This remount of the 2019 critically acclaimed and multi-award nominated production toured to eight locations across the UK: Glasgow, Edinburgh, Ipswich, Brixton in SW London, Canterbury, Coventry, Barnsley and Greenock in Inverclyde. While the "At Home" experience reached families across the country, including Fife, Stirling, Leicester & London.

Sound Symphony was presented 28 times across the UK towards low-capacity audiences of 211 autistic young people with complex needs and their families - a total of 433 attenders.

Press: "It was a joy to see the young people getting engaged and enjoying the performance and I would recommend this to anybody who is a parent or carer of such a young person." Suzanne Hawkes, British Theatre Guide

Audience comments: "We loved it and wanted to come again." I thought it was incredible. Every child engaged and participated in their own way. The children were encouraged to be themselves through the whole performance, it was very emotional at times. "(My son) really loved it...calling it a magic show...thanks so much to all involved"

Surveys were distributed at all live performances. 58 responses from the audience of 433. Average responses included: It was absorbing and held my attention 90%; It was well thought through and put together 92%; It was an interesting idea/programme 93%; It was an enjoyable shared experience 91%; &, I would recommend this experience to others 94%.

Sound Symphony "At Home" was delivered to 41 families across the UK, allowing these families who are unlikely to access a live artistic production, an opportunity to experience an interpretation of the work in their own homes and at their own pace. Each package included: a magical sensory box filled with sounds, textures and smells for families to unpack, play and create with together at home; a link to a musical sensory film to inspire creative activities. One family said about their package: "The quality of the sensory box was amazing. I'm going to develop more ideas from it."

Fifteen families were surveyed about their experience of the "At Home" experience and 100% stated that they would attend At Home events and experiences again: "My son is very anxious and struggles to get out to places. Because it was at home he could focus. It's ideal. He could properly engage."

Maya and The Whale is the story of a young climate activist on the run, grappling for hope amid unfolding global disasters.

Maya finds herself face to face with a dying whale and is confronted with the enormity of the task ahead. Her dad works in the oil industry and her mum just wants her to enjoy a childhood free of worry, but how can she go about business as usual when there's a Climate Emergency?

The audience plays the part of the dying whale in this darkly comic and provocative one-woman-show for a generation faced with unprecedented challenges.

Performers Hazel and Nik used only trains and bicycles borrowed from West Lothian Bike Library to tour Scotland. They presented 28 performances of Maya and the Whale to pupils from 34 schools across Scotland in February and March 2023. 2,608 young people and teaching staff engaged with the show.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

Income for the year was in the form of grants and earned income from presentations in UK and overseas.

The charity reserves are £159,323 of which £146,359 will be spent on projects within a year. The company will be working towards securing reserves to cover three months of operating costs.

FUTURE PLANS

Development of educational resources and presentations in schools in Scotland: SEX EDUCATION XPLORERS (S.E.X.) by Mamoru Iriguchi Independent Arts Projects supported this development period in May & June 2022.

Performers - Mamoru Iriguchi, Afton Moran, Lou Brodie Dramaturg & Engagement Artist - Lou Brodie Outside Eye - Clare Duffy

This team were supported to present two performances in schools and work with young audiences at Tynecastle High School in Edinburgh, Ullapool High in Highland to create a Zine and post-show workshop inspired by the themes of the production in collaboration with 80 young people. 177 young people participated in two post-show Q&As and five zine-making workshops. One CPD (continuing professional development) event was held for teachers through the National Teachers Theatre Club.

The Zine is both a standalone artwork, packed with resources and lived experience, encouraging readers to start their own zine-making activities in addition to complementing the audience's experience of the show. The knowledge and expertise the S.E.X. team gained from the collaborative development of Zine & Workshop with young people will feed into curation the future presentations of this production. S.E.X. tours Scotland in 2023.

Research and development of a new production for future presentation:

SHO AND THE DEMONS OF THE DEEP by Zoë Bullock

An Independent Arts Projects production with development supported by National Theatre of Scotland through a Develop Artist Residency awarded to Zoë Bullock.

Sho's city has been plagued by nightmares for as long as she can remember, but hers are the worst of all. One day, Sho has had enough. She throws her nightmares away into the Clyde, where they wash out to sea. Soon people start copying her; the city is rid of its nightmares, and everyone is delighted. But sixty years later, when a deadly cost to this new method raises its head, Sho's granddaughter Hana must journey to the ocean to save their city. A visual-adventure story about overcoming fear, climate crisis, and how the actions of one generation can affect the next. Inspired by the picture book of the same name by Annouchka Gravel Galouchko.

This period focussed on development of the script and design for a new visual adventure show for intergenerational audiences aged 8 and over. As part of the script development, Zoë Bullock and facilitator Sarah Rose Graber delivered workshops for P5 and P6 classes at Annette Street Primary School and St Alberts' Primary School in Glasgow. This new work will premiere in 2024.

Governing document

The Charity is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity. It is governed by the terms of its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Organisational structure

The Directors of the charitable company are its Trustees for the purpose of charity law and are responsible for governing the charity. The Board of Trustees meet quarterly to discuss the company's activities and governance. Additional meetings are arranged if required for fundraising, finance, recruitment or other matters as deemed necessary.

The Trustees who served during the year were: Mrs F E Fraser Mr L Mullin (appointed 7th December 2022) Mrs H P Roberts Ms V Rutherford-O'Leary Mx R E Schwarz (appointed 15th March 2023) Ms S A Shaarawi (appointed 1st June 2022) Ms K S Stuart (resigned 1st June 2022)

The Charity can appoint up to 10 Trustees at any one time. In accordance with the Articles of Association all Trustees shall retire from office every year and are eligible for re-election.

Trustees are recruited for their understanding and support of the work of the company and the specialist skills and knowledge. The current trustees have skills in the areas of running a charitable company, arts management, financial management, production management and fundraising.

Trustees review the composition of the board in relation to skill, ability and background and consider potential new candidates for appointment at trustee meetings. New trustees may be elected by the board to membership and then appointed to the board or recruited by open application.

Staff are appointed by the Trustees to manage the day-to-day operations of the organisation. The staff have authority to delegate duties as required to other staff members and contractors to ensure the smooth running of the company.

Independent Arts Projects employs Mhari Robinson as Executive Producer, Nina Doherty as Sensory Producer. Kirstin Abraham, Dr Sonia Allori, Kirsty Nicolson, and Joanna Young are employed and Max Alexander and Niroshini Thambar are engaged as Sensory Artists.

The company is committed to ensuring it has all the necessary policies and procedures in place to ensure the effective running of the company and to safeguard all employees, contractors, audiences and participants.

Decision making

The Trustees review the principal risks and uncertainties faced by the company at each quarterly board meeting. The major risk of financial uncertainty is mitigated by budgeting and forecasting.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

33% on cost

Computer equipment

- 33% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
